What is Child Care Health Consultation: Skill Building Modules?

Child Care Health Consultation: Skill Building Modules is a series of learning activities developed for child care health consultants (CCHCs) by the National Center on Early Childhood Health and Wellness (NCECHW). The activities incorporate realistic scenarios to help CCHCs understand the early care and education environment and strengthen their skills in building trusting and collaborative relationships with ECE providers. Strong relationships are key to effective consultation.

How long is each activity?

Allow 15-30 minutes to complete each activity and review the reflective feedback. You don't have to complete them all at once. You can complete the activities in any order; however, consider doing *Build Trust with Programs* last – it's a great culmination of the skills developed in other activities.

How can I use these activities?

- Complete these activities to strengthen your ability to collaborate with directors, teachers, and family child care providers to promote health, safety, and wellness.
- Use the activities to supplement training in core areas of health and safety in ECE settings, such as <u>safety</u> <u>practices</u>, <u>physical health</u>, <u>oral health</u>, <u>nutrition</u>, and <u>mental health</u>.
- Share the activities with other professionals who work with ECE programs, such as Head Start Health Managers, nutrition specialists, and mental health consultants.
- Include the activities in professional development offered through state, tribal, or territorial training programs, QRIS programs, and other CCHC training systems.

Where can I find more resources to support my work as a child care health consultant?
