ENGAGING IN MAKE-BELIEVE PLAY

- Copy the sounds, gestures, facial expressions, and actions of your baby. This is not only fun for your baby, but also lays the groundwork for social relationships and make-believe play.
- Play games. Games such as peek-a-boo help children learn to engage and interact with other people.
- Follow your child's lead and join in their make-believe play. Use your imagination and follow your child's lead! If your toddler is playing with pots and pans on the floor, join in and pretend that you're cooking or grab a spoon and pretend they're drums!
- Read and tell stories. This is a great way to learn about the different characters they can pretend to be and the different situations they can act out in their own play.
- When it comes to toys, think simply and creatively. When choosing toys, the simpler the better. For example, toys that talk and move can be limiting, as children may only use them in one way. Simple materials, such as a cardboard box or some newspaper can also encourage children to think creatively.
- Don't be afraid to have unscheduled time. Having unscheduled time in your child's day can provide the time they need to engage in make-believe play on their own, with siblings, other family members, friends, or you!
