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

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
ELOF Sub-Domain Indicators: Relationships with Other Children

- Emotional Environment



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
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Adults:

- Help keep all children safe
- Modeling initiating play with a new friend
- Model and support emotional understanding and conflict resolution

















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


Supporting Children with Disabilities in Peer Play


- Accessible environment

- Space for solo play


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







