


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




What do children do when they have strong friendship skills?

- Gentle touches
- Kind words
- Affectionate
- Are helpful
- Take turns
- Share toys and materials
- Give compliments or play ideas
- Understand how and when to repair or apologize
- Begin to empathize



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Problem Solving

Steps: the process of identifying a problem to finding a solution

Solutions: actions one can take to solve a problem




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What skills do children need to be successful at problem solving?



- Initiate and respond to others
- Play with others
- Identify emotions
- Regulate emotions
- Identify the problem
- Identify possible solutions

- Giving a turn or toy
- Asking for a turn or toy
- Conversational turn-taking
 - Asking questions and giving responses to questions

- Plan for when to practice skills






 - skills before problems arise • Children are never too young to start teaching!




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Focus on Equity

Are ALL children getting what they need to be successful?

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
Focus on Equity

How can a coachee be sure they are being culturally responsive to a families' values related to friendship and problem solving?

- Make sure skills are culturally relevant to families
- Gather input about social problems children face at home
- Gather information about family values
