


1302. 31 Teaching and the Learning Environment

- A program must recognize bilingualism and biliteracy as strengths ...
- · These practices must:
- (i) For an <u>Infant or toddler dual language learner</u>, include teaching practices that focus on the development of the home language...and experiences that expose the child to English;
- (ii) For a <u>preschool age dual language learner</u>, include teaching practices that focus on both English language acquisition and the continued development of the home language; or,
- (iii) If staff do not speak the home language of all children in the learning environment, include steps to support the development of the home language...


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

Goals of Dual Language 50/50 CLM

ALL children will become bilingual

Develop age-level skills in **English** and in another language in the "Big 5"

Learn value of different languages/cultures

Enhance children's identity and positive self-concept

Staff and families work together to support children



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Home Language as Foundation for English CLM

Used primarily in infant/toddler programs (Birth-3)

All the children hear/speak the same home language

All the children are dual language learners

English is gradually and intentionally introduced







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




- Age-level development of English over time (2nd language acquisition)
