Why is it Important to Engage Fathers?

Engaged fathers prepare children

- For school: stronger cognitive and motor skills
- For peer interactions: social emotional benefits
- For addressing challenges: improved problem-solving skills



Children with engaged fathers enjoy elevated levels of physical and mental health; are more confident, curious, and empathetic; and show greater moral sensitivity and self-control.

Strategies for Practice: Strengths-based Attitudes



- Fathers are the first and most important teachers of their children.
- Fathers are our partners with a critical role in their family's development.
- Fathers have expertise about their child and their family.
- Fathers' contributions are important and valuable.

Strategies for Practice: Relationship-based Practices

- Observe and describe the child's behavior to open communication with the father
- Reflect on the father's perspective
- Support competence
- Focus on the father-child relationship
- Value a father's passion
- Reflect on your own perspective
